Office of Distance Education

We have moved our offices to the Kunsela C101 suite. We have created workspace studios designed to allow faculty, students, and staff to come in and work on materials using ready-made studios for production and receive help from our staff in designing courses, improving content, and developing presentations. The studios have a variety of hardware and software to help you create vibrant content or even teach from a small studio free of distractions.

We have moved the smartboard from the library administrative area to the conference/classroom in the suite and have turned it into a model learning center. There are still a few finishing touches to do in space but look for an announcement of a spring open house. Feel free to drop in for a tour.

Workshop times and dates offered by our office are available at this Workshop Link. Workshops that we offer include but are not limited to Alternative Assessments, Effective Feedback, Respondus Lockdown Browser/Monitor, Improving Your Online Class, Effective Student Engagement in Online/Remote Classes, Universal Course Design, Preparing for the New Semester, Blackboard Grade Center, Rubrics, and a series of *open lab drop-in sessions* each week. We also offer to consult for deep dives into your course to work with you to bring your ideas to life.

D2L Transition News

We are almost finished with the transition from Blackboard to D2L Brightspace. We are still technically in the transition period, but we are fully operational at this point.

We have cut off access to Blackboard since the contract expired on December 31st. We are waiting for the Blackboard archive to be created and the campus admins to be granted access. Once that happens, we will be able to give faculty access to their old courses. Our migration request form is currently closed during this transition to the archive. Blackboard archive that will allow us to export more courses as needed but no student will have access.

We were able to work out a new contract with a few other SUNY schools to continue to have Collaborate Ultra as a conferencing option in addition to Class. Class Technologies purchased Collaborate Ultra from Blackboard allowing us to secure both systems. Collaborate Ultra has a couple of features that are missing in Class that allow students to be in a session without the instructor.

We have been working on tutorials that you can find on Brightspace when you first log in. Training opportunities, videos, and transition information can also be found on the <u>SUNY Digital Learning Environment website</u>. You will be asked to log in to the site using your SUNY Poly credentials.

Accessibility News

We continue to see our Ally accessibility report showing that the number one problem with course content is images without descriptions. Many of these images are just PowerPoint slides in .jpeg format or images of charts and graphs. Please, if your course uses images of PowerPoint slides, put in meaningful descriptions or use the actual PowerPoint slides so a screen reader can tell students what the image information is. We find many of the same slide images used every semester and we should be doing better for our students. You can learn more about writing good image descriptions at this W3.org link.

DAISY Consortium has an excellent webinar video series that can help you understand how to write good descriptions at this YouTube link, where they walk through different images. "This webinar builds on our first image description session to take a deeper dive into describing images, talking through plenty of examples from initial assessment through to a solution, and starting to address some of the more complex challenges which can arise from common image types." Please take some time to review the captions for your videos. The captioning process for videos is automatic in Panopto, but as content owners, you will need to review and publish the transcriptions to make the closed captioning visible and check for accuracy.
