### **PROPOSED MINUTES**

- 1. Chairman Patrick H. Brennan called the meeting to order at 6:45 PM and welcomed the group. There were no minutes of the last meeting.
- 2. President's Notes:
  - a. Dr. Yeigh introduced the President's Cabinet members and Roger Cavallo.
  - b. Dr. Yeigh proposed the Council meet four times per year, with the agenda including brief, summary reports from the President and Vice Presidents, and a discussion of one substantial item.
  - c. Dr. Yeigh proposed a permanent binder of Council documents for each member, to be kept in the President's Office. The consensus was approval.
  - d. Status of the Institution
    - i. Dr. Yeigh is optimistic—the institution is poised to move forward. There are challenges and issues, including the NYS budget cuts that began while Dr. Yeigh was a candidate for the Presidency. Over 10% of SUNYIT's operating budget has been cut.
    - ii. Dr. Yeigh's plans for the campus include three strategic objectives and two tactical objectives:
      - 1. Strategic Objectives
        - a. Financial Equilibrium
          - i. Sustain enrollment growth
          - ii. Expand philanthropy
          - iii. Broaden external programs: scholarly research, corporate partnerships, community college partnerships
        - b. Academic Success
          - i. Propose and implement new degree programs outlined in MOU
          - ii. Enhance current degree programs
          - iii. Strengthen student support services

- iv. Support and grow faculty
- v. Improve student retention: currently 70% (SUNY System average), with the goal to exceed the SUNY average
- c. Capital Programs: all four projects are necessary for growth:
  - i. Student Center
  - ii. Athletic Complex
  - iii. Dormitory
  - iv. Advanced Technology Center: residence for the School of Information Systems and Engineering Technology
- 2. Tactical Objectives
  - a. Upgrade communication within the campus and with the community
    - i. Establish President's Blog
    - ii. Post minutes of President's Cabinet meeting
    - iii. Develop SUNYIT's web presence
    - iv. Boost communication with alumni and the community
  - b. Fortify assessment programs
    - i. Employ surveys for continual improvement
    - ii. Support and build campus assessment procedures
- 3. President's Cabinet Briefs:
  - a. Academic Affairs: Rosemary Mullick
    - i. Two new degree programs approved and marketed
      - 1. BS in Criminal Justice
      - 2. MBA in Health Services Management
    - ii. Three program revisions proposed
    - iii. Four programs announced, with external review underway.
    - iv. Two accreditation visits planned for Fall 2008

- 1. School of Business initial accreditation visit in October
- 2. School of ISET technology programs: re-accreditation visit in November
- v. Partnerships under development
  - 1. School of ISET with Nanchang University, China
  - 2. School of Nursing and Health Systems + Department of Psychology and Sociology with various universities in Brazil
- vi. Review of School of Nursing and Health Systems partnership with St. Elizabeth Hospital
- b. Administration: Bruce Reichel
  - i. Budget
    - 1. Increases in areas which could not remain flat: collective bargaining, hiring of adjuncts since we're holding down faculty numbers, utilities
    - 2. State funding did not meet our projections. State will fund only 1811 FTE, while our Fall 2008 enrollment is projected to be 1970 FTE. Campus response: pulled from reserves, cut temporary service funding, requested SUNY System continue transitional funding.
    - 3. Currently, partial allocations have been made for each school and area. Campus has upheld our commitment to the financial plan.

# ii. Capital Projects

- 1. Currently underway: redesigned front entrance to Kunsela Hall with heated walkway, three new entrance signs for campus, relocate electrical systems in preparation for Athletic Complex (cost approximately \$600,000).
- 2. Construction projects:
  - a. Student Center groundbreaking planned for October, projecting bidding this fall, with construction projected to begin in Spring 2009 and occupancy projected for Fall 2010.
  - b. Athletic Complex occupancy projected for Fall 2010.

- c. Advanced Technology Center funding has not been finalized and NYS Legislature has placed ceiling on awards. Mr. Reichel plans to determine programming for ATC during AY 2008-2009.
- d. 250-bed Dormitory, specifically for freshmen, occupancy projected for Fall 2012.
- 3. Discussion of campus housing. Projecting small housing shortage next year, with a larger shortage in year after. Developing relationships with local landlords to provide off-campus housing. Dorms must be financially self-sustaining. Construction of new dorm will take two to three years.
- c. Student Affairs and Development: Bill Murabito
  - i. Enrollment
    - 1. Fall 2008 enrollment projected to be 1969 FTE; actual numbers are headcount of 2892 (2312 undergraduates, 580 graduates) and FTE of 2081. This fall we're enrolling foreign undergraduates for the first time.
    - 2. Retention efforts are reviewed by the campus Retention Task Force.
    - 3. Task Force for Student with Disabilities reviewed campus services for disabled students. 73 disabled students registered last year.

## ii. Athletics

- 1. SUNYIT joined a new athletic conference this year: NEAC—North Eastern Athletic Conference. Institutional members are closer to SUNYIT's size.
- 2. Department is considering adding lacrosse.

### iii. Student Affairs

- 1. Currently reviewing Camps Judicial Code. Anticipating College Council will receive proposed changes for review and approval in Spring 2009.
- 2. Planning programming for new facilities

### iv. Development

1. Consultants from SUNY System reviewing development program.

- 2. Investigating software for on-line financial transactions, including donations.
- 4. Information: SUNY System Discrimination Complaint Procedure reviewed. While the changes are cosmetic, this is a good opportunity for Council members to revisit the procedure. This procedure affects students, faculty and staff. Estimate of two complaints per year.
- 5. Chairman Brennan: It is anticipated the Chairman will call for a motion to convene an Executive Session under provisions of Section 105 of Article 7 of the Public Officers Law:
  - "...the proposed acquisition, sale or lease of real property or the proposed acquisition of securities, or sale or exchange of securities held by such public body."
- 6. Chairman Brennan: Council returned to public session and Chairman Brennan called for a Motion to Adjourn. Mrs. Lockwood made the motion, Dr. Max seconded, and the motion passed unanimously. Meeting was adjourned at 9:15 PM.
